(2) LEARNING OUTCOMES

Learning outcomes

The broad character of social-psychological topics reflects its position between sociology and central approaches of psychology. Within social psychology there is a continuum of topics covering the following spectrum: individual, dyad, group, society. This course aims to introduce and cover theories and procedures operating mostly on the two first levels. More specifically, it will focus on individual and interpersonal cognitive procedures, as well as their relationship with broader social structures and norms. The general argument that will be discussed refers to the construction of social reality being the result of procedures that operate simultaneously on the individual, interpersonal and social level. Emphasis will be given to studies that have used the experimental method.

Once the course is completed, participants will be able to:

- Evaluate the central theoretical approaches in social psychology
- Assess theories and methods on different levels of analysis
- Assess the effect of social context on social behavior
- Critically evaluate the different methods for the study of social behavior and the

construction of the social world of the individual
