# **Learning outcomes**

The basic aim of this Seminar is to give students the chance to acquire basic knowledge related to postpartum depression and to undertstand the implications of it for the development of infants and children through the variability of experiences that form the early interactions with Significant Others (e. g. mothers, fathers).

In particular, after the completion of this seminar students are expected to:

- Have understood the characteristics of maternal and paternal postpartum depression,
- Have recognized the implications of postpartum depression for the cognitive, the social and emotional development of infants and children, as these are derived from recent empirical studies,
- Have understood the different but complementary impact that Significant

Others have (mothers, fathers) in the early stages of development,

- Have defined the variability of experiences that form infant development in different cultural contexts,
- Have understood the importance of quality of early interactive experiences for later development.

- Interventions for maternal and paternal postpartum depression,
- Implications of postpartum depression on the cognitive, the social and emotional development of infants and children. Are there variations in the implications between maternal and paternal postpartum depression?
- Postpartum depression in groups of high-risk mothers (abused, adolescent and epileptic mothers),
- The manifestation of maternal and paternal postpartum depression in different cultural contexts,
- Description and analysis of postpartum depression cases.
