### 2. LEARNING OUTCOMES

Learning Outcomes
<p><i>The aim of this course is to provide an introduction to the effects of culture on different aspects of behavior (both normal and abnormal).</i></p> <p>At the end of the course, students must be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Define the scientific area of Cross-Cultural Psychology and distinguish Cross-Cultural Psychology from Cultural Psychology.</li> <li>• Become familiar with the research strategies of Cross-Cultural and Cultural Psychology.</li> <li>• Realize the limitations of psychometric tests (e.g., intelligence and personality tests), when these tests are applied in individuals coming from non Western cultures.</li> <li>• Realize the effect of culture on different aspects of human behavior (e.g., emotions, perception, different states of consciousness).</li> <li>• Realize that personal relationships (e.g., friendships, family relationships) have similarities and dissimilarities across nations.</li> <li>• Find out the reasons of conflicts between groups of different cultural background and the role that ethnocentrism, prejudice and racism play in these conflicts.</li> <li>• Realize the problems that immigrants and refugees face in their acculturation process.</li> <li>• Realize the challenges of diagnosis and counseling with individuals from different cultural backgrounds.</li> </ul>

### 3. COURSE CONTENT

- Definition of Cross-Cultural Psychology and culture
- Methodology of Cross-Cultural and Cultural Psychology: Emic and Etic Research paradigms.
- Cross-Cultural aspects of cognitive processes and perception: The measurement of intelligence and personality in individuals from different cultures.
- The cross-cultural approach of developmental psychology: The theory of Piaget in individuals from different cultures.
- The self in cultural context: Independent/Interdependent self-construal and behavior.
- Communication and personal relationships in different cultural contexts: Romantic relationships, friendships, and family relationships.
- Relationships between groups: Ethnocentrism, stereotypes, prejudices, and racism.
- Culture and organizational behavior: motives, successful leadership, negotiation and decision making.
- Immigrants, psychological health and family relationships: Acculturation and adaptation.
- Psychological health of refugees: Post traumatic stress and interventions in camps.
- Culture and psychopathology: Cultural syndromes, similarities and dissimilarities in anxiety, depression and psychosis between individuals from different cultures.
- Counseling: The role of cultural values in the therapeutic relationship.
