2. LEARNING OUTCOMES

Learning Outcomes

The goal of this course is on the one hand the students' familiarity with the study of the criminal phenomenon and on the other the formation of a scientific perspective for the crime and the perpetrator. During the semester emphasis will be given on the study of criminal behavior and on the research of its causes. An additional goal is the cultivation of a rational approach to the criminal phenomenon, the abandonment of stereotypical approaches and the treatment of the criminal as an individual with personal rights.

On the successful completion of the course students are expected to have:

- ➤ Understood the causes of criminogenesis and their multifactorial dimension
- ➤ Perceived the systematic ways of studying the criminal phenomenon, the particularities and the research difficulties that arise
- ➤ Perceived the crime as a social phenomenon and the criminal as a human being with inexplicable rights
- ➤ Been updated for the modern criminological directions and challenges
- ➤ The ability to interpret the crime more fully by looking at their scientific knowledge, to be able to detect cases of social reality "construction" by the media and not resort to absolute and unilateral interpretations of the criminal behavior, but to review stereotypes and prejudices by adopting a rational attitude towards the risk of our societies and towards the diffuse "moral panic" that is usually created by crime in the social circle
- > To assess the role and boundaries of the criminologist that works for the criminal justice system
- > To be aware of the rule and basic ethical principles that govern the work in a specific system and field of work
