In this seminar, students will explore theoretical approaches to the process of dying and the psychosocial processes of grief. The course builds on basic theoretical approaches in the field of Health Psychology and Personality Theories, which students have learned in their respective background courses, as well as in certain elective courses (e.g., Health Psychology: Clinical Applications – Ψ3604). It focuses on and delves into those areas of Health Psychology that concern the reactions of individuals to death and dying, the individual and social representations of death and grief/mourning and the corresponding psychological theories, and the use of psychological techniques to provide relief to the dying and the bereaved.

During the meetings, students are expected to:

- Become familiar with the basic and contemporary literature on death, mourning, and the corresponding psychological theories.
- Conduct relevant bibliographic research using databases, and synthesize the relevant literature.

- Critically analyze, summarize, and present original research articles.
- Reflect on the ethical implications and practical applications of the research presented during the seminar.
- Acquire knowledge about the application of relevant theories and empirical data in the relief of the dying and the bereaved.

(3) SYLLABUS

The course content is linked to the five core areas of the curriculum: (Scientific Foundations [1], Scientific Research and Critical Thinking [2], Ethics and Social Responsibility [3], Communication Skills [4], Basic Preparation for Career Decisions and Professional Rehabilitation [5])

From the third week onwards, students will present articles related to the respective topic. Experiential exercises will be conducted where appropriate.

Week 1: Description of the seminar and learning objectives and procedures. General introduction. [1, 5]

Week 2: What is loss - grief - mourning. Historical overview. Cultural perceptions and rituals. [1, 2, 5]

Week 3: Psychological and social processes. [2, 3, 4]

Week 4: Development of theories of mourning. Types of grief and mourning. [2, 3, 4]

Week 5: Social media and public expression of grief. The representation of death and grief in art. [2, 3, 4]

Week 6: Mental resilience and loss. Dysfunctional and pathological mourning. Health implications. [2, 3, 4]

Week 7: Mourning in childhood and adolescence. [2, 3, 4]

Week 8: Coping with loss in adulthood—loss of a partner, child. [2, 3, 4]

Week 9: Coping with atypical losses in adulthood (e.g., perinatal grief, diagnosis of terminal illness, sudden loss, loss of functionality, loss of employment and/or housing) [2, 3, 4]

Week 10: Managing loss in older adults (retirement, loss of physical and social functioning, loneliness, loss of a partner or adult child). [2, 3, 4]

Week 11: Loss management techniques for mourners. [2, 3, 4]

Week 12: Loss management techniques for mourners. Palliative care. [2, 3, 4]

Week 13: Ethics and moral dilemmas. How technological developments affect death and mourning (e.g., digital legacy). [2, 3, 4, 5]
